**Tully's Trump
Accountability Plan**

Article I - Exerting Congressional Power

1. Hold ICE Accountable

We need to create a commission in the House of Representatives that is dedicated to ensuring ICE accountability. By using the full force of the law, we will subpoena the Department of Homeland Security to disclose travel records, vehicle logs, and agent rosters to identify every masked ICE agent who committed a crime. Congress will prosecute every single ICE agent who has violated any civil rights and ban them from ever holding a job in the federal government again.

2. Reassert Congress' War Powers

For far too long, Presidents have wielded too much power over how, when, and where we conduct military action. Congress needs to be clear that no President should be able to conduct military strikes without Congressional approval. We shouldn't be thrown into a military conflict without the direct input of Congress and the constituents they represent.

3. Reclaim Tariffs

President Trump's trade wars have wrecked havoc on our economy. No President should have the power to unilaterally decide economic policy without consulting Congress. It puts small business owners, employers, and working people at risk of losing their livelihoods. We need a Congress that will end the Trump tariffs and prevent any President from abusing tariffs to feed their trade wars.

Article II - Limiting Presidential Power

1. Independent and Elected Attorney General

The Attorney General is the country's chief law enforcement officer. They are meant to be independent and removed from partisan politics. However, their independence has been slowly eroded. Presidents have appointed Attorneys General who work for them and go after their political enemies. By electing our Attorneys General to four year terms in alternating elections of the President, we ensure an independent AG who will uphold the rule of law.

2. Limit the Pardon

President Trump has used the pardon as a get out of jail free card for his friends and business allies. Time and time again, Presidents have used the pardon to protect their political allies, donors, and families. We need Congressional approval in the pardon process. The pardon is meant for mercy, not for power. We will end corruption and put justice back into the pardon process.

3. Impeach Criminal Civil Officers

When I was a federal employee, I was surrounded by people who upheld the rule of law and led with integrity. However, the current administration continues to put themselves above the law. We need to be clear, when you break the law, you must face justice. Any civil officer that manipulates, circumvents, or breaks the law should face impeachment.

4. Chief Executive and Cabinet Level Asset Divestment

President Trump, his family, and his cabinet have used their titles and proximity to power to enrich themselves instead of improving Americans' lives. We must establish a mandatory Presidential Code of Ethics that prevents Presidents, their families, and cabinet members from profiting off of their positions — and breaking that Code must be a high crime punishable by impeachment.

5. Incarcerate Defiant Cabinet Officials

Congress will use its inherent contempt power to demand accountability from the lawless Trump officials. Anyone who defies Congress will be subject to arrest by the Sergeant-at-Arms.

Article III - Reforming the Supreme Court's Power

1. Mandatory Ethics Code

The current Supreme Court ethics code is not true accountability, just the appearance of accountability. The public's trust of the Supreme Court is at an all time low. To restore the public's faith in the rule of law, the Supreme Court must have full financial transparency, mandatory recusals when a conflict of interest arises, and Congressional checks on the Court when they break the rules.

2. Supreme Court Senior Status Term Limit Rotation

For too long, Presidents have been able appoint Supreme Court justices that serve their agendas for generations. The Supreme Court has failed to keep pace with developments in the legal world. After 18 years in full active service on the Court, Justices should transition to senior status and allow a new generation of legal minds to enter the Court.
